4. Presentations and Delegations

a. Civic addressing by Jordan Stackhouse, Community Advisor/YG Community Affairs

Jordan started by giving us a summary of the project. In 2012, Mt Lorne was part of the first round of communities getting civic addresses.

Recently, YG completed the rest of civic addressing in the territory. It has not been a smooth process. YG completed the pilot and it went well but they still have some issues completing the project, they are working on it right now.

Method used: satellite tour of the Yukon and try to identify properties and then they provided those parcels addresses. Some mistakes appeared and are still present.

Nobody is working on this project full time, people at YG work on it when they can.

Al Foster shared some of his observations/frustration. The past promises have not been fulfilled, there is a lack of data. During the elections, some people wanted to vote but had problem registering due to their address not being right, it was frustrating. Mt Lorne was one of the first community to go through the process of civic addressing. The issue is that the person using the GIS does not seem to be familiar enough with GIS to resolve the issues on the ground.

The community center is not on the civic address map. But in the first version it was. The firehall is also missing, as well as the transfer station. Same for the firehall at

Hootalinqua. Key buildings are missing on maps and this is a big issue. Also, some roads have wrong names.

Areas that should not have civic addresses appear to have civic addresses which is confusing because they are not residences. First nations residences do not have civic addresses. Jordan said that initially they contacted the first nations and informed them on the project. The parcel survey lot could not be implied at large on first nations land. first nations residences, YG not having the authority to give civic addresses on first nation land. Residents of Mt Lorne still think it would be nice to point a first nation residence or give it a number because it would be useful for the firehall, RCMP and EMO in case of an emergency.

YG use Canada Lands survey site to build their civic address maps. This site doesn't show up institutional reserves such as firehalls and community centers. The person in charge of creating the maps should be aware of this discrepancy.

Frustration come from the fact that some residents and the firehall of Mt Lorne gave a lot of corrections in the past to correct the data. But now those corrections have been lost. Also, Mt Lorne has been picked for the Emergency measures project, which requires updated maps.

Jordan wants to address the inconsistencies. YG can come back to that and correct the mistakes. YG has the ability to create new addresses and correct the data. Jordan is ready to commit on this and get it right and update the maps as soon as possible. The aim for YG is to share those maps to firehalls and other institutions once they are confident on their data. Jordan apologized on behalf of his branch to the community.

It will also be good to tell different institutions that they have to use the old addresses and new civic addresses to locate residence in Mt Lorne because some residences still use the lot number and don't have a civic address. Jordan took note of that comment.

b. Cemetery

During the meeting about Yukon Water Forum, Peter asked people there if they would be interested to put a water system at the cemetery. They said no because it takes so long, and they don't think it would be useful.

Peter also asked somebody from YG why we have so many discrepancies on the data and the person answered that it depends on where the information come from. It will be hard to have fixed data from YG.

One question was raised by 2 residents: does the cemetery society has the support from the community? Al created a survey about the support of the cemetery and will send it to as many people as we can reach.

c. Public Water Supply

We are at 55 answers, 36 000 liters per month. The challenge is that Facebook and the LMCA mail list does not reach everybody in the community. Also, some people don't want to put their full contact information in the survey so Etienne has been accommodating them.

d. Dry Hydrants Feasibility Study

Gareth apologized for the delay, they were not happy about the first version of the report. The finalized version of the report has just been finished. The project for the dry hydrant in Mt Lorne is not feasible on Annie Lake Road. But the second site proposed is possibly feasible.

e. CTFN Comprehensive Community Plan Project

Still at the information gathering stage. They have undertaken a very big project.

f. Brushing at Triple Cross Road/Annie Lake Road intersection

Etienne cleared it.

g. Mineral Staking and Development in Yukon Communities

Lisa spoke to Jocelyn at Land Planning about when we could set up the pre-engagement meeting with them. They are fine for us to schedule the meeting in January. So, Lisa can follow up with that when she gets back.

h. 2019 Yukon Water Forum

Peter attended the forum that happened in Carcross. This is where he asked people about creating a water system at the cemetery.

i. Kookatsoon Lake Road Signs

MLAC suggests a sign that say no campfires during fire bans.

Residents of Kookatsoon road would like a more comprehensive signs at the beginning of the road saying no through road, or limited turning, or no lake access or dead end. Andrea will ask people at YG about this.

December 11th from 7 to 10 p.m, will be held a meeting on wildlife regulation.

Fire smarting has started around the firehall, it is going well. Unfortunately, somebody already took the signs and some wood. We are hoping to have the wood for the community center.
